Year 7 Catch Up Premium Impact 2015-16 and Intended spend 2016-17

The Government has made a commitment to provide additional funding to schools for each year 7 pupil who did not achieve at least level 4 in the Key Stage 2 national curriculum tests in reading and/or mathematics. The purpose of this funding is to enable schools to deliver additional support, such as individual tuition or intensive support in small groups, for those pupils who need it most.

In 2015-16 the total allocation to Upper Wharfedale School was £7,500.

Below is an outline of how this additional funding has been used to benefit these students:

There were 15 students who entered school below level 4 in either English, Maths or English and Maths.

Students in English received specialist teaching from a primary trained member of staff in a small class. Progress was strong and at least expected by all, more than expected for two thirds. All of these students also participated in the 'catch up' programme which concentrated on the teaching of phonics/spelling and followed the spellzone programme. On our new 0-9 scale 1.5 is roughly equivalent to an old level 4b and a 1.2 a level 4. All children reached at least secondary ready by the end of year 7 in English.

There were 10 students who were below level 4. These students received additional tuition twice a week from the primary trained member of staff and followed the success@arithmetic programme. All but one then went on to make at least expected progress. The majority made accelerated progress.
